





Overview of ADM options

Delivery model	Ownership	Governance	Services
Remaining in-house with re- engineering	100% parent LA	Within LA management structures and hierarchy	Can only deliver local public sector services
Local Authority Trading Company (LATC) Sometimes referred to as a Wholly Owned Company	100% parent LA(s)	Can be designed for flexibility/autonomy Requires an LA appointed Board SLA/contract with parent LA(s) – control test	Flexible – but majority of services delivered on behalf of parent LA(s) – <i>function test</i>
Public Service Mutual (PSM)	 Variety of options: LA + staff Staff + community 100% staff 	Can be designed as required Board membership dependent upon ownership SLA/contract with LA(s) Well positioned to promote co-production	Flexible – can deliver services to LAs, private or VCS customers
Outsource to existing social enterprise, third sector or private provider	100% third party provider	Arranged via contract Well positioned to promote co-production	Contracted services delivered on behalf of LA(s)
Joint Venture (JV)	Potential for joint ownership, including staff, LA(s) and/or third party provider	Can be designed as required SLA/contracts as required Well positioned to promote co-production	Flexible – can be delivered to LA(s) and private/VCS customers




Potential benefits

Single focus organisation	Increase staff motivation and engagement	Decisions involve end-users more effectively
Reduced costs	Less red tape enables faster decisions	Develop commercial behaviours & timely decision making
Potential to deliver over a wider area	Community involvement	Enable innovation

Legal form

Form follows function

- Examples of legal form:
 - Limited Company most common legal form. Limited either by Shares (shareholders) or by Guarantee (members)
 - Community Interest Company (CIC) custom made for businesses that want to use their profits for public good, but are not eligible to be charities. All have an "asset lock"



- Registered Societies puts values and principles at the heart of what it does. Formed for the benefit of its members or for the benefit of the community
 - **Co-operative Society** trading for the benefit of its members
 - Community Benefit Society trading for the benefit of the wider community
- Charitable Incorporated Organisation (CIO) First corporate structure specifically designed for charities or charitable groups that wish to be incorporated




 Social enterprise - "Businesses with primarily social objectives whose surpluses are principally reinvested for that purpose in the business or in the community, rather than being driven by the need to maximise profit for shareholders and owners"

 Charity - "An institution which is established for charitable purposes only...where charitable purpose is a purpose which is for the public benefit"



- Do you have a clear vision and strategy for your library service?

- Consider the democratic decisionmaking process
- Don't underestimate the emotional impact
